Welcome to worship today—it is great to have you with us. We hope that you will feel welcome in our worship today. If you are new, please do say hello—we would love to get to know you. If you are unsure where to find something, or about what is going on, please do ask and we will be happy to help. Our worship style is quite formal-but we hope relaxed-as we come to worship God in our midst. Please do join us for refreshments after the service.

Today we move onto the second book of Samuel where we hear David's lament after the death of Saul and Jonathon. This like many of the passages in second Samuel is difficult and in many ways uncomfortable to our modern ear. Maybe it can serve as a passage that helps us understand the raw emotions of war, companionship, and death.

1st Reading- 2 Samuel 1: 1, 17-end

Then After the death of Saul, when David had returned from defeating the Amalekites, David remained two days in Ziklag. David intoned this lamentation over Saul and his son Jonathan. (He ordered that The Song of the Bow be taught to the people of Judah; it is written in the Book of Jashar.) He said: Your glory, O Israel, lies slain upon your high places! How the mighty have fallen! Tell it not in Gath, proclaim it not in the streets of Ashkelon; or the daughters of the Philistines will rejoice, the daughters of the uncircumcised will exult. You mountains of Gilboa, let there be no dew or rain upon you, nor bounteous fields! For there the shield of the mighty was defiled, the shield of Saul, anointed with oil no more. From the blood of the slain, from the fat of the mighty, the bow of Jonathan did not turn back, nor the sword of Saul return

empty. Saul and Jonathan, beloved and lovely! In life and in death they were not divided; they were swifter than eagles, they were stronger than lions. O daughters of Israel, weep over Saul, who clothed you with crimson, in luxury, who put ornaments of gold on your apparel. How the mighty have fallen in the midst of the battle! Jonathan lies slain upon your high places. I am distressed for you, my brother Jonathan; greatly beloved were you to me; your love to me was wonderful, passing the love of women. How the mighty have fallen, and the weapons of war perished!

We continue our readings from the second letter to the Corinthians today. While this text certainly forces us to think about what we do with our resources, Paul's passion in this text relates first of all to the gospel. How believers use their resources -- time, money, talents, and attention -- is a reflection of what they believe about God and God's actions in the world.

2nd Reading-2 Corinthians 8:7-15

Now as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you—so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking. I do not say this as a command, but I am testing the genuineness of your love against the earnestness of others. For you know the generous act of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, so that by his poverty you might become rich. And in this matter I am giving my advice: it is appropriate for you who began last year not only to do something but even to desire to do something—now finish doing it, so that your eagerness may be matched by completing it according to your means. For if the eagerness is there, the gift is acceptable according to what one has—not according to what one does not have. I do not mean that there should be relief for others and pressure on you, but it is a question of a fair balance between your present abundance and their need, so that their abundance may be for your need, in order that there may be a fair balance. As it is written,

'The one who had much did not have too much, and the one who had little did not have too little.'

Our Gospel Reading Our Gospel reading today Mark 5: 21—end.

In today's Gospel reading (Mark 5:21-43) has a sense of déjà vu . Once again Jesus is in and near the sea and great crowds are gathered around him. Both Jairus and the woman come to Jesus after reaching the end of their resources. Both figures fall down at the feet of Jesus, a gesture of respect if not servitude. Faith is connected with the action of the woman (v. 34) and the need of Jairus (v. 36). In these stories

healing comes to a woman at the margins of community and to the daughter of a community leader. Neither can save themselves. But the woman, and Jairus for his daughter, risk reaching out beyond themselves. Both find healing in God. Do we risk such a healing reach: for ourselves, for those we love, for another we encounter on the way?
