

Trinity Sunday

Welcome to worship today—it is great to have you with us. We hope that you will feel welcome in our worship today. If you are new, please do say hello—we would love to get to know you. If you are unsure where to find something, or about what is going on, please do ask and we will be happy to help. Our worship style is quite formal- but we hope relaxed-as we come to worship God in our midst. Please do join us for coffee after the service.

Trinity Sunday (Today) is the first Sunday after Pentecost in the Western Christian liturgical calendar, and the Sunday of Pentecost in Eastern Christianity. Trinity Sunday celebrates the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, the three Persons of God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Our first reading is taken from Proverbs and explores the nature of wisdom. In the text appointed for today, Wisdom is personified as female, and in her humanity finds all knowledge, insight, and truth. Wisdom is also portrayed as delighting God and in human beings.

1st Reading— Proverbs 8: 1-4, 22-31

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? On the heights, beside the way, at the crossroads she takes her stand; beside the gates in front of the town, at the entrance of the portals she cries out: 'To you, O people, I call, and my cry is to all that live. The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water. Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills, I was brought forth— when he had not yet made

earth and fields, or the world's first bits of soil. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above, when he established the fountains of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit, so that the waters might not transgress his command, when he marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him, like a master worker; and I was daily his delight, rejoicing before him always, rejoicing in his inhabited world and delighting in the human race.

In this passage from the letter to the Romans we mark a major transition in Paul's letter to the Romans from faith to hope. In these 5 verses for Trinity Sunday mentions God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit. We have peace with God (verse 1). This peace, as well as access to grace, has come through Jesus Christ (verse 2). Moreover, God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit (verse 5). The Son gives us access to God's glory and the Spirit pours out God's love for us.

2nd Reading— Romans 5: 1-5

Therefore, since we are justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have obtained access to this grace in which we stand; and we boast in our hope of sharing the glory of God. And not only that, but we also boast in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not disappoint us, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit that has been given to us. '

Our Gospel Reading

Our Gospel reading today is John 16:12-15 . John 16:12-15 begins with Jesus telling his disciples, "I still have many things to say to you, but you cannot bear them now" (v. 12). What Jesus says here seems to contradict what he had just told the disciples in 15:15. Within the framework of the Fourth Gospel's theology, Jesus is the full and complete revelation of God. To see him is in fact to see God (John 14:9; cf. 1:18). This is why Jesus can say in earnest that he has revealed everything from God (15:15). This is also why Jesus's words in 16:12 cannot mean that there is new content to his revelation. But we cannot bear it on our own, we rely not only on the spirit but our interconnectedness within the kingdom of God. On this trinity Sunday we are invited to consider how we are in God, and how we rely on God's spirit to fulfil our call.
