# Second Sunday before Lent 4<sup>th</sup> February 2024

Please stand as the bell is rung as we sing our opening Hymn 10- All creatures of our God and King verses 1,2,3 and 7

We meet in the name of God who is (+) Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

The Lord be with you. **And also with you.** 

The President will introduce the service.

We make our confession for those things which separate us from

God so loved the world that he gave his only Son Jesus Christ to save us from our sins, to be our advocate in heaven, and to bring us to eternal life. Let us confess our sins in penitence and faith, firmly resolved to keep God's commandments and to live in love and peace with all.

# Silence is kept

Almighty God, our heavenly Father, we have sinned against you and against our neighbour in thought and word and deed, through negligence, through weakness, through our own deliberate fault. We are truly sorry and repent of all our sins. For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ, who died for us, forgive us all that is past and grant that we may serve you in newness of life to the glory of your name. Amen.

We sing together.

Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy.

We are reminded of God's forgiveness.

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, (+) pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.** 

We lift our voices in thanksgiving in the words of the Gloria.

Refrain: Glory to God, Glory to God, Glory to God in the highest. Glory to God in the highest, and peace to His people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship You we give You thanks, we praise You for your glory. *Refrain:* 

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God You take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; You are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. *Refrain:* 

For You alone are the Holy One, You alone are the Lord, You alone are the most high Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, In the glory of God the Father. *Refrain*.

The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer before the collect. Almighty God, you have created the heavens and the earth and made us in your own image: teach us to discern your hand in all your works and your likeness in all your children; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who with you and the Holy Spirit reigns supreme over all things, now and for ever. **Amen.** 

*Liturgy of the Word* (please sit as the young people leave us for their lessons. We hear a reading from the Old Testament.

In the text appointed for today, Wisdom is personified as female, and in her humanity finds all knowledge, insight, and truth. Wisdom is also portrayed as delighting God and in human beings. verses 22-31, is a striking passage that describes the indispensable role of Wisdom in creation, and the infusing of Wisdom throughout the created order. Wisdom, she proclaims, was created at the beginning of Yahweh's work, "the first of his acts long ago" (verse 22). A reading from the Book of Proverbs (*Proverbs 8:1, 22-31*)

Does not wisdom call, and does not understanding raise her voice? The Lord created me at the beginning of his work, the first of his acts of long ago. Ages ago I was set up, at the first, before the beginning of the earth. When there were no depths, I was brought forth, when there were no springs abounding with water. Before the mountains had been shaped, before the hills. I was brought forth— when he had not vet made earth and fields, or the world's first bits of soil. When he established the heavens, I was there, when he drew a circle on the face of the deep, when he made firm the skies above, when he established the fountains of the deep, when he assigned to the sea its limit, so that the waters might not transgress his command, when he marked out the foundations of the earth, then I was beside him, like a master worker; and I was daily his delight, rejoicing before him always, rejoicing in his inhabited world and delighting in the human race.

This is the word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.** 

We hear a reading from the New Testament.

Colossians 1:15-20 -- offers its own Christological images test, laying out a myriad of ways to describe and understand Christ. These images might be drawn into 2 groups—firstly Christ is described as the "image" of God and as the "fullness" of God. Secondly— "fullness" refers to fullness in the sense of completeness, totality, as in "everything God is or does was present in Christ."

A reading from the letter to the Colossians (Colossians 1: 15-20)

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

This is the Word of the Lord. **Thanks be to God.** 

We sing our **Gradual Hymn 743** -**There is a redeemer** during which we stand for the Gospel procession.

The Prologue to John's Gospel is John's birth story of Jesus. The themes we have come to know for Christmas preaching are certainly present in how John begins his gospel. John's description of Jesus in the Prologue is poetic, even lyrical speech. It is an echo of or response to God's love song, which is Christ. John sings that Jesus is the Word of God become flesh. who from all eternity was with God, and actually is God. While we think of "word" as something written or printed, John's description of Jesus as logos means first of all something said. Reread John 1:1-14 aloud, substituting speech for word, and hear the difference it makes. In Luke's Christmas story, angels bring the good news of great joy. In John, Jesus has been singing love and bringing life from the beginning. What does it mean for us that Jesu is the word made flesh? *Genesis tells us that God said, "Let there be . . . " and there was.* God spoke day and night, heaven and earth, land and sea, plants and animals, and humanity into being. Jesus is that utterance. Jesus is God's eternal speech, which existed before anything else and called everything into being.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John **Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ** 

(John1: 1-14)

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. **Praise to You, O Christ.** 

We sit to listen to the sermon. After the sermon silence is kept.

*We stand to affirm our faith:* Let us declare our faith in God.

We believe in God the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named. We believe in God the Son, who lives in our hearts through faith, and fills us with his love. We believe in God the Holy Spirit,

#### who strengthens us with power from on high. We believe in one God; Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

We sit as we prayer for the Church, the World and for this community. A member of the congregation will lead these After the biddings we pray

Lord in your mercy Hear our prayer

Rest Eternal Grant unto them O Lord And let light perpetual shine upon them May they rest in peace And rise in glory

At the conclusion of the prayers

Merciful Father, accept these prayers for the sake of your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

Liturgy of the Sacrament (please stand)

Blessed are the peacemakers: they shall be called children of God. We meet in the name of Christ and share his peace. The peace of the Lord be always with you **and also with you.** 

Let us offer each other the sign of peace.

We share the peace with those around us in a way we are comfortable until the offertory Hymn is announced. We sing Hymn **52 – At the name of Jesus (v1,3 and 6)** during which a collection is taken.

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation: through your goodness we have this bread to set before you, which earth has given and human hands have made. It will become for us the bread of life.

#### Blessed be God for ever.

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation: through your goodness we have this wine to set before you, fruit of the vine and work of human hands. It will become for us the cup of salvation. **Blessed be God for ever.** 

The Lord be with you, **And also with you.** 

Lift up your hearts. We lift them up to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

The preface continues until we sing.

Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna, Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna, Hosanna, Hosanna in the highest.

After the Consecration : Great is the mystery of faith Christ has died: Christ is risen: Christ will come again

At the end of the Eucharistic Prayer we sing Amen.

We join in the prayer that Jesus taught his friends to say in our preferred version and language.

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.

The president breaks the consecrated bread. We break the bread of life, and that life is the light of the world. God here among us, light in the midst of us, bring us to light and life

We sing the Agnus Dei.

The Elevation God's holy gifts for God's holy people. Jesus Christ is holy, Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father

We receive communion. All who would normally receive are welcome to, and you may choose if you are ready to receive the chalice. We receive God's grace in one kind or two. (Please do not intinct (dip)). You may also like to come forward for a blessing; and you may wish to light a candle. During communion we listen to Bruckner – Christus Factus Est (Christ became obedient)

At the end of communion, the priest will lead us in a period of silence, and then a short prayer:

God our creator, by your gift the tree of life was set at the heart of the earthly paradise, and the bread of life at the heart of your Church: may we who have been nourished at your table on earth be transformed by the glory of the Saviour's cross and enjoy the delights of eternity; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen** 

We listen to the notices about our community life.
