The President will introduce the service followed by a time of confession after which silence is kept:

Let us confess our greed and repent of the ways in which we have damaged God's good creation:

Holy and merciful God, we confess that we have failed to honour you and all of your creation. We have walked heavily on your earth, overused and wasted its resources, taken for granted its beauty and abundance, and treated its inhabitants unjustly. Have mercy on us and forgive us our sin. Renew in us faith and action to care for your earth as you desire and intend, with grateful and compassionate hearts, through Jesus Christ, your son, and our Lord. Amen.

We sing together.

Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy, Christ have mercy, Christ have mercy, Lord have mercy, Lord have mercy.

We are reminded of God's forgiveness.

Almighty God, who forgives all who truly repent, have mercy upon you, (+) pardon and deliver you from all your sins, confirm and strengthen you in all goodness, and keep you in life eternal; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

We sing our praise in the words of the Gloria

Refrain: Glory to God, Glory to God, Glory to God in the highest.

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to His people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship You we give You thanks, we praise You for your glory. *Refrain:*

The Collect

The Priest introduces a period of silent prayer and then says: Creator God, you made the goodness of the land, the riches of the sea and the rhythm of the seasons; as we thank you for the harvest, may we cherish and respect this planet and its peoples, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Liturgy of the Word (please sit)

We hear a reading from the New Testament 1 and 2 Timothy are pastoral letters, written by Paul as encouragement, setting out how followers of Christ should live. Today's section focuses on the role everyone has, to pray. Prayer which addresses the needs and voice of all creation and is expressed in the way we live.

A reading from the letter to Timothy (1 Timothy 2: 1-7)

First of all, I ask that you pray for all people. Ask God to bless them and give them what they need. And give thanks. You should pray for rulers and for all who have authority. Pray for these leaders so that we can live quiet and peaceful lives—lives full of devotion to God and respect for him. This is good and pleases God our Saviour.

God wants everyone to be saved and to fully understand the truth. There is only one God, and there is only one way that people can reach God. That way is through Christ Jesus, who as a man gave himself to pay for everyone to be free. This is the message that was given to us at just the right time. And I was chosen as an apostle to tell people that message. (I am telling the

truth. I am not lying.) I was chosen to teach those who are not Jews to believe and understand the truth.

This is the word of the Lord

Thanks be to God

We hear a stories from young people in our congregation about their experience of God's Creation over the summer – what did they see and hear? What worried you? Where did you see the beauty of God's creation and God caring for the earth.

We sing our **Gradual Hymn - 67 - Beauty for Brokenness v 1,3** and 5 Please stand during the last verse as the Gospel is processed.

Society has changed a great deal since the time of Jesus. Definitions of poverty, wealth, and the good life are much different today than they were then. The implication of Jesus' message here is that much of what matters to us today, the material aspects of our lives, ought not to be taken seriously and can be completely entrusted to a God who cares for us.

Hear the Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ

(Matthew 6: 25-33)

Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed

like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? Therefore do not worry, saying, "What will we eat?" or "What will we drink?" or "What will we wear?" For it is the Gentiles who strive for all these things; and indeed your heavenly Father knows that you need all these things. But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

We sit to listen to a homily

Our readings today invite us not to worry, despite the pain we see in creation. They invite us to consider how we are part of God's time, how we try not to worry but are good stewards and ambassadors of God's creation.

Steven helps us think about what we have heard...

We stand to affirm our faith in the words of the creed.

Let us declare our faith in God.

We believe in God, who creates all things, who embraces all things, who celebrates all things, who is present in every part of the fabric of creation. We believe in God as the source of all life, who baptizes this planet with living water. We believe in Jesus Christ, the suffering one, the poor one. the malnourished one, the climate refugee, who loves and cares for this world and who suffers with it. And we believe in Jesus Christ, the seed of life, who came to reconcile and renew this world and everything in it. We believe in the Holy Spirit, the breath of God, who moves with God and who moves among and with us today. We believe in everlasting life in God.

And we believe in the hope that one day God will put an end to death and all destructive forces. We believe in one God:

+Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer, Amen.

God of grace, as you are ever at work in your creation, so fulfil your wise and loving purpose in us and in all for whom we pray, that with them and in all that you have made, your glory may be revealed and the whole earth give praise to you, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Liturgy of the Sacrament (please stand)

The harvest of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. The peace of the Lord be always with you and also with you.

Let us offer each other the sign of peace.

We share the peace with those around us in a way we are comfortable until the offertory Hymn is announced. We sing Hymn **801 – we plough the fields and scatter** during which a collection is taken, and our Harvest goods are placed in front of the altar.

Let us give thanks for the symbols of the harvest, gifts that God has created and his sun and rain have nurtured. **Thanks be to God.**

The earth has yielded its harvest; God, our God, has blessed us. **Thanks be to God.**

We give thanks for this bread and wine In which we share together. Let us feed on him by faith with thanksgiving. **Thanks be to God.** During the Hymn a collection is taken for the maintenance, mission and worship of St Anne's . Cash can be placed in the bowls that are passed around, or you can use the contactless point at the rear of church. We join in the prayer that Jesus taught his friends to say in our preferred version and language.

Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.
Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and for ever. Amen.

The president breaks the consecrated bread.

We break this bread to share in the body of Christ.

Though we are many, we are one body,
because we all share in one bread.

We sing the Agnus Dei.

The Elevation

God's holy gifts for God's holy people.

(+) Jesus Christ is holy, Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

We receive communion, during which we listen to Sam play. All who would normally receive are welcome to, and you may choose if you are ready to receive the chalice. We receive God's grace in one kind or two. (Please do not intinct (dip). You may also like to come forward for a blessing; and you may wish to light a candle. At the end of communion, the priest will lead us in a period of silence, and then a short prayer:

Lord of the harvest, with joy we have offered thanksgiving for your love in creation and have shared in the bread and the wine of the kingdom: by your grace plant within us a reverence for all that you give us and make us generous and wise stewards of the good things we enjoy; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

We listen to the notices about our community life. **The Dismissal** (please stand) We receive God's Blessing.

The Lord be with you **And also with you**

May God who established the dance of creation, Who marvelled at the lilies of the field, Who transforms chaos to order, Lead us to transform our lives and the Church To reflect God's glory in creation.; and the blessing of God almighty, (+) the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. **Amen.**

Go in the peace of Christ.
